Labyrinth**
A Lenten Devotional

Introduction

This season leads us through moments we think we understand, only to surprise us with a turn we did not see coming. Dust becomes the beginning of breath. Loss opens into life. The cross does not end the story. Grace interrupts where we expected resolution.

This year, we walk the labyrinth together—a path shaped by turns rather than shortcuts. The labyrinth does not test us or trick us; it invites us to trust the path beneath our feet. Like the parables Jesus told, it draws us forward through reversals and interruptions, teaching us that God often works through surprise rather than certainty.

As we journey through Lent, we will listen again to stories marked by plot twists: seeds scattered without guarantee, lost things found in celebration, grace that feels unfair yet proves abundant, love that grows quietly until it shelters the world. Each story begins in familiar ground and then turns, asking us to see differently and live more deeply.

The path is not meant to be hurried. You may feel turned around at times—but disorientation is often where transformation begins. In God's time, what feels like circling becomes a deeper movement inward, and every unexpected turn becomes an invitation into grace.

Walk slowly. Pay attention to the turns. Trust the story still unfolding. How to Use This Devotional Each day offers three simple movements:

- Scripture: A single verse to center your attention and prayer.
- Wandering Deeper: A brief reflection or small action to guide your contemplation. Some are inward, others outward — each is an invitation, not an obligation.
- Prayer: A few lines to speak aloud or hold in silence.

Sundays are marked as “Little Easters.” They are pauses in the Lenten fast — reminders that even in the wilderness,

resurrection hums beneath the surface. Use these days for rest, joy, and gratitude. You can walk this journey alone or with others.

Families may adapt the reflections with simple gestures: lighting a candle, planting a seed, sharing one word of gratitude. The point is not to finish perfectly but to stay open to grace.

The God who formed you from dust will walk beside you through every turn — calling you deeper, not farther; wider, not faster; homeward, not elsewhere.

Threshold Days

Ash Wednesday – The Beginning in Dust

Scripture: “Return to me with all your heart.” — Joel 2:12

Wandering Deeper: Touch the earth, a handful of dust or soil. Remember: this is where your story begins — and where God’s story meets yours. Say aloud, “From dust I came, to dust I return, and love holds me still.”

Prayer: Creator of beginnings, form me again from the soil of your mercy. Let my repentance be more than words — let it be a turning of my heart. Teach me to walk humbly in your love. Amen.

Thursday

Scripture: “Create in me a clean heart, O God.” — Psalm 51:10

Wandering Deeper: Sit in silence for one minute. Each breath in: receive mercy. Each breath out: release shame.

Prayer: Merciful God, clear the clutter of guilt and fear. Make room in me for grace to grow. Let forgiveness flow like breath, freely given, freely received. Amen.

Friday

Scripture: “The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases.” — Lamentations 3:22

Wandering Deeper: Think of one place in your life where you feel worn down or weary. Name it quietly. Imagine God’s love wrapping that place in light.

Prayer: Faithful One, meet me where I am tired. Remind me that your mercy never runs out. Let your love renew my strength. Amen.

Saturday

Scripture: “Be still and know that I am God.” — Psalm 46:10

Wandering Deeper: Spend five minutes in stillness. No goal, no prayer — just presence. Notice what rises when

you stop moving.

Prayer: God of stillness, help me rest in your quiet. Calm my racing mind and anxious heart. Let me find you not in striving, but in stillness. Amen.

Week 1 — Scattered

Sunday (Little Easter)

Scripture: “The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.” — John 1:5

Wandering Deeper: Today, release your fasting. Feast on joy — a meal, a laugh, a walk in sunlight. Every Sunday is a resurrection echo: a reminder that the story bends toward life.

Prayer: Risen Christ, lift my eyes to see your light breaking through the shadows. Let joy rise quietly within me today. Even here in Lent, resurrection hums beneath the soil. Amen.

Monday

Scripture: “The sower went out to sow.” — Mark 4:3

Wandering Deeper: Take a seed, a stone, or something small in your hand. What are you holding tightly? What would happen if you trusted God enough to release it?

Prayer: Generous Sower, open my hands. Let what I let go become part of your harvest of grace. Where I see scarcity, teach me to see abundance. Amen.

Tuesday

Scripture: “Some seeds fell on rocky ground.” — Mark 4:5

Wandering Deeper: Think of one hard place in your heart. Ask God to soften it — not by force, but by steady rain. Let compassion seep in slowly.

Prayer: Tender Gardener, break the stones within me gently. Water the dry places until mercy takes root. Let your love grow even where I've lost hope. Amen.

Wednesday

Scripture: "Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them." — Mark 4:7

Wandering Deeper: Name one thing that chokes your peace — too much noise, hurry, worry, or striving. Practice trimming one "thorn" back. Leave space for silence to grow instead.

Prayer: Patient God, untangle what has overgrown my heart. Pull back what keeps your peace from breathing. Let stillness and simplicity bloom again in me. Amen.

Thursday

Scripture: "Still other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain." — Mark 4:8

Wandering Deeper: Think of someone whose faith has nourished yours. Write a note or text of thanks to them. Your gratitude will plant another seed of blessing.

Prayer: Gracious Gardener, thank you for the people who have tended me with love. May I, in turn, nurture others with patience and grace. Let kindness root deeply in us all. Amen.

Friday

Scripture: "The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain." — Mark 4:28

Wandering Deeper: Notice one small, almost invisible way you're growing. Give thanks for that quiet progress, without rushing it. Growth unseen is still growth.

Prayer: God of gentle becoming, thank you for the work you do in secret. Even when I cannot see it, you are shaping me for fruitfulness. Keep me patient and grounded in your time. Amen.

Saturday

Scripture: "Let anyone with ears to hear listen." — Mark 4:9

Wandering Deeper: Take a moment today to listen — to creation, to someone's story, to your own breath. Let your listening become prayer.

Prayer: Listening God, tune my ears to your quiet word. Help me hear the sacred beneath the ordinary. Let every sound remind me of your presence. Amen.

Week 2 — Found

Sunday

Scripture: “Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost.” — Luke 15:6

Wandering Deeper: This Sunday, rest in the joy of being found. Let your prayer today be laughter, gratitude, or song. Even in Lent, heaven is still celebrating.

Prayer: God of joy, thank you for searching until I was found. Let my life be your rejoicing — a song of love returned. Help me delight in the grace that never stops seeking. Amen.

Monday

Scripture: “Which one of you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the one that is lost?” — Luke 15:4

Wandering Deeper: Think of a time you felt left behind or unseen. Imagine Jesus searching for you — not with judgment, but with joy. Rest in that belonging.

Prayer: Faithful Shepherd, you find me when I wander far. Thank you for your patient pursuit of my heart. Keep me close, and teach me to notice those still missing. Amen.

Tuesday

Scripture: “When he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders and rejoices.” — Luke 15:5

Wandering Deeper: Close your eyes. Imagine being lifted, carried, safe. Let yourself rest in the strength of the One who bears your burdens.

Prayer: Gentle Christ, carry me when I am too weary to go on. Teach me to trust your hold, and to lift others in love when they cannot stand alone. Amen.

Wednesday

Scripture: “Or what woman, having ten silver coins, if she loses one, does not light a lamp, sweep the house, and search carefully until she finds it?” — Luke 15:8

Wandering Deeper: Light a candle today. As it burns, ask God to reveal something precious that has been lost in you — joy, courage, or tenderness.

Prayer: Light of the world, shine in my hidden corners. Help me rediscover what I thought was gone. Let your light restore my wonder. Amen.

Thursday

Scripture: “When she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbors.” — Luke 15:9

Wandering Deeper: Reach out to a friend or neighbor today simply to share joy — no reason but love. Connection is heaven’s celebration echoing on earth.

Prayer: Gathering God, draw us into your circle of joy. Help me celebrate others’ gladness as my own. Make my friendships signs of your restoring love. Amen.

Friday

Scripture: “There is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents.” — Luke 15:10

Wandering Deeper: Think of one place in your life that needs a gentle turning — not guilt, but realignment. Even repentance can be joy when it leads you home.

Prayer: God of grace, help me turn toward you without fear. Let repentance be my freedom, not my shame. Guide me home to the joy that waits in your mercy. Amen.

Saturday

Scripture: “It is not the will of your Father in heaven that one of these little ones should be lost.” — Matthew 18:14

Wandering Deeper: Pray for someone who feels overlooked — a child, a neighbor, a stranger. Ask God to help you be part of their finding.

Prayer: God of the least and the lost, keep my heart tender. When others are forgotten, send me to remember them. Make my compassion the lamp that lights the way home. Amen.

Week 3 — Unfair Grace

Sunday (Little Easter)

Scripture: “The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard.” — Matthew 20:1

Wandering Deeper: Rest today in the truth that God seeks you out before you even begin the work. Grace begins in invitation, not achievement.

Prayer: Generous God, you call me before I am ready and love me before I am worthy. Help me rest in your choosing and trust the vineyard of your grace. Amen.

Monday

Scripture: “He went out again about nine o’clock and saw others standing idle in the marketplace.” — Matthew 20:3

Wandering Deeper: Notice who is left waiting in your community — those unseen, overlooked, or passed by. How might you bring them into belonging?

Prayer: Welcoming Christ, keep my eyes open to the ones still waiting for a place. Make room in me for every soul who longs to be called to work in your vineyard. Amen.

Tuesday

Scripture: “He went out again about noon and about three o’clock, and did the same.” — Matthew 20:5

Wandering Deeper: Think of a time when you were late to something but still welcomed. Let that memory soften how you see others’ timing.

Prayer: Patient Lord, thank you for calling me again and again. When I am late to faith or love, remind me that your invitation still stands. Amen.

Wednesday

Scripture: "About five o'clock he went out and found others standing around." — Matthew 20:6

Wandering Deeper: Is there a place in your life where you've given up waiting for purpose? Imagine God coming to that hour and saying, "You, too — come."

Prayer: God of the late hour, thank you for not forgetting me. Call me again into your vineyard, and teach me that your grace is never too late. Amen.

Thursday

Scripture: "When evening came, the owner said, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay.'" — Matthew 20:8

Wandering Deeper: Think of what it means to be paid in grace — not in fairness, but in love. What would change if you received instead of earned?

Prayer: Merciful Giver, I bring you my efforts and my emptiness. Teach me to live by gift, not by merit. Let your generosity shape my worth and my way. Amen.

Friday

Scripture: "When the first came, they thought they would receive more." — Matthew 20:10

Wandering Deeper: Where do you find yourself comparing? Offer that envy or resentment to God — not to erase it, but to transform it into gratitude.

Prayer: Loving God, when I measure myself against others, remind me of your abundance. Free me from jealousy, that I may rejoice in others' blessings as my own. Amen.

Saturday

Scripture: "Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?" — Matthew 20:15

Wandering Deeper: Reflect on how God's generosity unsettles and liberates you. Today, practice unfair grace — forgive quickly, give freely, love without return.

Prayer: God of abundant mercy, your generosity unravels my pride. Teach me to give as freely as you do. Let my life reflect the wideness of your grace. Amen.

Week 4 — Hidden Kingdom

Sunday (Little Easter)

Scripture: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field." — Matthew 13:31

Wandering Deeper: Today, rest in small beginnings. Let your joy be quiet, your gratitude simple. God's kingdom often starts in whispers, not thunder.

Prayer: God of small wonders, thank you for beginnings I almost overlook. Teach me to trust the promise hidden in what is small. Let joy take root in gentle soil today. Amen.

Monday

Scripture: "It is the smallest of all the seeds." — Matthew 13:32

Wandering Deeper: Think of something small you can do today — a note, a smile, a prayer. Small acts have great weight in the kingdom's scale.

Prayer: Humble Christ, remind me that greatness begins in small kindness. Bless every quiet gesture of love until it grows beyond my sight. Amen.

Tuesday

Scripture: "But when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs." — Matthew 13:32

Wandering Deeper: Consider how something once small in your life has become strength — a friendship, a practice, a seed of courage. Give thanks for God’s slow, steady work.

Prayer: Patient God, thank you for the growth I did not see happening. Help me trust your timing when I long for quick results. Let my faith deepen through waiting. Amen.

Wednesday

Scripture: “It becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches.” — Matthew 13:32

Wandering Deeper: Look for “nests” of kindness around you — safe places where others rest because of your care or someone else’s. Bless them silently.

Prayer: Sheltering God, may my life grow into a refuge for others. Let love stretch wide enough to give rest to the weary. Make my branches strong in mercy. Amen.

Thursday

Scripture: “The kingdom of God... grows, though we do not know how.” — Mark 4:26–27

Wandering Deeper: Release the need to understand every mystery. Sit in trust that God is working where you cannot see.

Prayer: Hidden God, I do not always understand your ways. Still, I believe in your quiet work beneath the surface. Grow faith in me that rests in unknowing. Amen.

Friday

Scripture: “With what can we compare the kingdom of God?” — Mark 4:30

Wandering Deeper: Write your own comparison today: “The kingdom of God is like...” Let your imagination name what holiness looks like in your world.

Prayer: Creator of metaphor, thank you for the stories that reveal your truth. Give me eyes to see your kingdom in

ordinary things — the cup, the seed, the hand extended in love. Amen.

Saturday

Scripture: “He spoke the word to them, as much as they were able to hear it.” — Mark 4:33

Wandering Deeper: Reflect on how God speaks gently — at a pace your heart can receive. Give thanks for divine patience.

Prayer: Whispering God, thank you for meeting me where I am ready to listen. Keep teaching me through small signs and quiet grace. Let your word grow in me day by day. Amen.

Week 5 — Given Back to God

Sunday (Little Easter)

Scripture: “There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower.” — Matthew 21:33

Wandering Deeper: Pause today and imagine your life as a vineyard — planted, protected, and prepared by God’s care. Everything fruitful begins in grace.

Prayer: Gardener of creation, thank you for this vineyard of life. May I tend it with love and gratitude, remembering it is yours. Let joy be my harvest today. Amen.

Monday

Scripture: “He leased it to tenants and went to another country.” — Matthew 21:33

Wandering Deeper: Consider what God has entrusted to you—your time, gifts, influence. Ask how you might care for those things as a faithful steward rather than an owner.

Prayer: Generous God, you trust me with your vineyard. Teach me to hold lightly and tend wisely. May I honor you in how I use what you’ve given. Amen.

Tuesday

Scripture: "When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce." — Matthew 21:34

Wandering Deeper: Reflect on what fruit your life is bearing this season—joy, patience, justice, mercy. Offer one of those fruits back to God in gratitude.

Prayer: God of harvest, receive what my life yields—even the imperfect fruit. Bless what is good, forgive what is lacking, and let all of it become nourishment for your world. Amen.

Wednesday

Scripture: "But the tenants seized his slaves, beat one, killed another, and stoned another." — Matthew 21:35

Wandering Deeper: Think of ways humanity resists accountability or silences truth. Offer a prayer for those who speak hard words of justice and for courage to listen.

Prayer: God of prophets, forgive when I ignore your messengers. Give me ears for truth and strength to stand beside those who risk for love's sake. Amen.

Thursday

Scripture: "Finally he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.'" — Matthew 21:37

Wandering Deeper: Ponder the love that keeps reaching out, even after rejection. Where might God be sending love to you again?

Prayer: Persistent God, thank you for sending love until I notice it. Teach me to honor your presence in unexpected messengers. Let your grace soften my resistance. Amen.

Friday

Scripture: "This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance." — Matthew 21:38

Wandering Deeper: Reflect on how greed and fear distort community—in our world and within yourself. Ask God to replace possession with peace.

Prayer: Merciful God, forgive the ways I grasp for what was never mine. Unclench my hands, that I might receive and release with grace. Teach me that love shared is never lost. Amen.

Saturday

Scripture: “The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone.” — Matthew 21:42

Wandering Deeper: What in your life once seemed broken or rejected but became foundational? Give thanks for what God redeems and reuses.

Prayer: Redeeming Christ, you make beauty from what we discard. Thank you for building your grace upon our weakness. May my life rest on the cornerstone of your love. Amen.

Week 6 — Holy Week

Palm Sunday (Little Easter)

Scripture: “Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!” — Luke 19:38

Wandering Deeper: Hold a palm or simply open your hands. Wave praise with one breath and humility with the next. The same hands that shout “Hosanna” will soon tremble in grief.

Prayer: Humble King, teach me to follow your unexpected way. Let my worship be gentle enough to serve, brave enough to weep, and faithful enough to follow you to the cross. Amen.

Monday (Cleansing of the Temple)

Scripture: “My house shall be called a house of prayer; but you are making it a den of robbers.” — Matthew 21:13

Wandering Deeper: Consider what needs cleansing within — your habits, your hurry, your cynicism. Make space for holiness again.

Prayer: God of truth, turn over what is false in me. Sweep my heart clean of what keeps love from thriving. Let my life become a house of prayer. Amen.

Tuesday (Teaching and Confrontation)

Scripture: "Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's." — Matthew 22:21

Wandering Deeper: Ponder what belongs to God — your heart, your time, your compassion. What would it mean to give those things fully back?

Prayer: Wise Teacher, help me discern what is truly yours. Keep me faithful when the world divides my loyalties. Let all that I am return to you in love. Amen.

Wednesday (Anointing at Bethany)

Scripture: "A woman came to him with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment, and she poured it on his head." — Matthew 26:7

Wandering Deeper: Think of an act of beauty or generosity that seems "wasteful" by the world's standards. Give something lavishly today — time, attention, kindness.

Prayer: Extravagant Christ, thank you for the beauty of love poured out. Teach me that devotion is never wasted. Let my giving be fragrant with grace. Amen.

Thursday

Scripture: "If I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet." — John 13:14

Wandering Deeper: Serve someone quietly today — a task no one notices. Let humility become your form of prayer.

Prayer: Servant Christ, kneel beside me again. Wash away my pride and fear. Make my hands instruments of love, my life a reflection of your mercy. Amen.

Friday (Good Friday)

Scripture: “And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death — even death on a cross.” — Philippians 2:8

Wandering Deeper: Sit in silence for five minutes. No words — only awareness of love that suffers willingly.

Prayer: Crucified Christ, hold me in the stillness of your love. Let this dark hour plant seeds of compassion within me. Teach me to trust the power of love that dies to live again. Amen.

Saturday (Holy Saturday)

Scripture: “They laid him in a tomb cut in the rock.” — Luke 23:53

Wandering Deeper: Linger in the silence between loss and resurrection. Resist the urge to rush toward Easter. Even in waiting, God is at work.

Prayer: Hidden God, meet me in the quiet of the tomb. When hope feels buried, keep watch beside me. Let stillness become the cradle of your new life. Amen.

Easter Sunday

Scripture: “Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen.” — Luke 24:5–6

Wandering Deeper: Step outside at dawn if you can. Breathe in the air of beginnings. Let every light, every sound, every heartbeat proclaim: Life begins again.

Prayer: Risen Christ, awaken me to resurrection. Turn my sorrow into song, my fear into courage, my doubt into wonder. Let new life rise in me, and through me, for the world you love. Amen.
